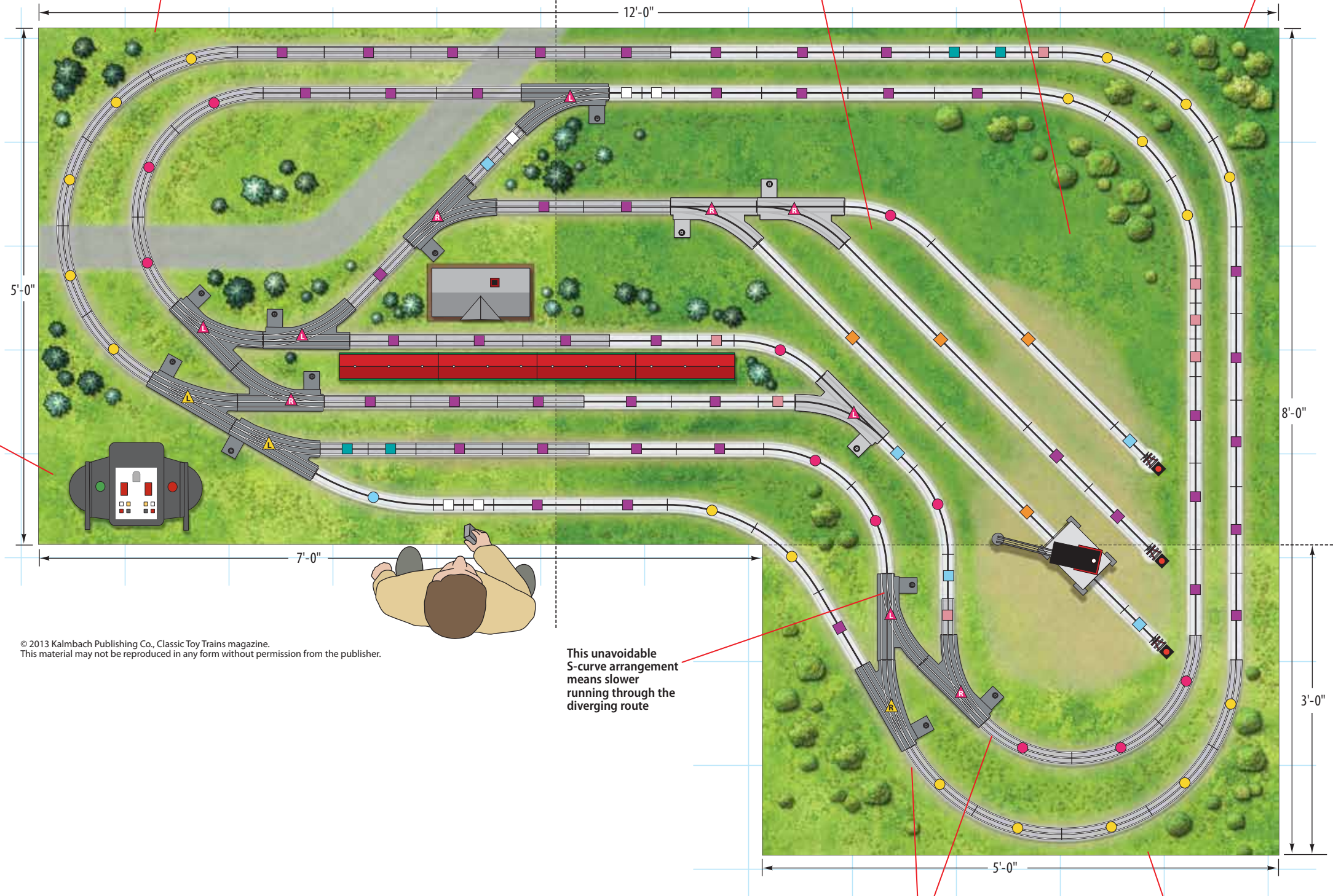


The 5 x 5-foot segment of the original tabletop

Additional real estate provides room for a three-track yard

With the added space, a layout with full scenery becomes a possibility. Including a mountainside or tall city structures here helps hide trains and add intrigue to an otherwise fully exposed layout

An access hatch becomes an essential addition if you position the expanded layout along the walls



The control panel can remain here, but moving it to the opposite end of the layout will provide better access to cars and accessories in the new yard area

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This unavoidable S-curve arrangement means slower running through the diverging route

When it comes to toy train layouts, more space equals more speed! The O-42 curves along the outer loop make it possible for passenger trains to stretch out. The pace on the inner loop may be a notch slower, but that's more suitable for the heavy hauling freight trains running here
